St. James's Region X Report 3/2/17

Highlights from the last few months:

- The Rev. Carmen Germino and Facilities Manager Matt Presson welcomed Christopher Silas Presson on February 20, 2017! Welcome, Chris! The Rev. Dr. Mark Cooper will be assisting with pastoral care and worship while Carmen is away on maternity leave.
- **The Rector Search Committee** began receiving names on January 1, 2017. It has extended its deadline from February 15 to March 10, 2017.
- St. James's vestry voted in November 2016 to update its **parental leave policy** to explicitly include all employees (lay and clergy), providing 12 weeks maternity leave and 4 weeks paternity leave. Paternity leave may be taken in a flexible manner.
- **Financial Peace University,** the nine-week faith-based course in financial wellness and stewardship, and its four-week parallel for youth, **Generation Change**, are offered for the first time this semester at St. James's. This popular and highly-effective course teaches basic personal finance skills through a Christian lens, including topics like getting out of debt, making a budget, saving, and giving. About 4 youth and their families graduated from Generation Change in February; currently about 30 adults ranging in age from 25 to 75 are enrolled in FPU, only about half of whom are St. Jamesers evangelism.
- Mardi Gras for Missions Feb. 28, 2017 -- this annual fundraiser raises all the money used to finance St. James's domestic and international missions for youth and adults, including international missions to Cuba, Haiti, Honduras, and local missions in Richmond and to the Northern Neck.
- **Field Trips** are a new and innovative formational offering this semester at St. James's. Initial field trips have included a nature hike at the Pony Pastures park led by parishioner and botanist Johnny Townsend and the Rev. Hilary Streever, and an upcoming guided tour of the VMFA's religious artwork and artifacts. These field trips are limited to 15-20 participants to encourage relationship-building.
- SnowFest The weekend of Feb. 23, 2017, 37 youth and 11 chaperones traveled to Shrine Mont for a weekend of fellowship, fun, and worship. The weekend was organized by Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries Mary Beth Abplanalp, and though no snow meant no skiing, the youth visited the Shenandoah Caverns, the Route 11 potato chip factory, and went duck pin bowling. Coached by the Rev. Hilary Streever, the youth led all the worship that weekend: Compline, Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer and Eucharist.

- We are reconstituting our Justice & Advocacy Team, one of its first initiatives a Huddle group now has over 60 names in the network, most drawn from the neighborhood.

Continuing Opportunities

- Inspired by our friends at Grace & Holy Trinity, St. Mark's has started a chapter of Boomers & Better, to be known as "Boomers & Better Boulevard". Regular events include weekly coffee and breakfast groups at the Westwood Pharmacy and the Best Café at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts. The Curmudgeon's Lunch is held on the 3rd Tuesday at Arianna's.
- Junior and Senior Youth Groups meet each month for fellowship and service.
- Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry is held on the Second and Fourth Sundays of each month, from 9:00 until 10:30 AM. This is a shared ministry with St. Andrews and others. It has expanded to offer pet food and clothing.
- We continue to collect and distribute clothing (including shoes) and personal care products for our food pantry guests. Current needs include rolling suitcases and duffles, backpacks, sleeping bags, rain gear, underwear and socks.
- A "Teen Learning About the Church Group" continues. They meet the first Sunday of every month except August. Among its learning goals is to prepare teens for confirmation.
- Three on-going Bible Study Groups: Buck's Bible Bonanza on Wednesday nights, 7:00 8:00 PM and the Wednesday Morning Bible Study (10:00 AM) led by Malinda Collier, and a Lectio group led by Father David (first Fridays at 8am).

 A women's spirituality group meets the first Tuesday of the month after our Neighborhood Dinner.
